The Enlightenment: late 1600s onwards

- The triumph of human knowledge
 - Massive increase in knowledge applied to ethics
 - Religion seemed dangerous, irrational etc.
 - Basic moral sense all reasonable people share
 - My will be done
 - Freedom from arbitrary rules
 - Human will as source of morality

Immanuel Kant 1724-1804

- → Choice (will) and reason = truly human
- → No need for revelation

The Politics of Enlightenment

I can make it on my own (Contractarianism)

No absolute moral standards, only by agreement

Humans aren't naturally social

Thomas Hobbes 1588-1679

Live and let live (Liberalism)

Freedom of conscience, tolerance

Limits on freedom only to ensure freedom of others

Society/government neutral in moral and religious matters

John Locke 1632-1704

The economics of the Enlightenment

laissez-faire capitalism

Markets determine prices and wages

Dissolution of social bonds (family, local safety nets)

Tendency to commodify: everything has a price

Recovering ethics in a world without God

Utilitarianism

- Maximising satisfaction i.e. outcomes
- Responsibility to shape history
- Not following rules but producing good consequences
- Cf. situation ethics
- "Pick the lesser of two evils" / "the end justifies the means"

Making progress

- Bacon and medicine
 - Opposition of weak body and strong mind
 - Suffering can and so must be overcome
- Politics and progress (Hegel and Marx)
 - Perfection can/will arise from human history by human action
